Many Hands Receives College Bound Award

Many Hands was honored to be chosen as the 2020 recipient of College Bound's Community Leadership Award and excited to join College Bound graduates and families for their virtual End of the Year Celebration in May.

College Bound's mission is to prepare public and public charter school students in the metropolitan DC area to enter college, earn a degree, and achieve their



personal and professional goals. With the support of the 2012 Many Hands \$100,000 Impact Grant, College Bound launched the Virtual Mentoring Program, which matches program alumni with virtual mentors who provide support throughout their college years. REPORTS FROM OUR 2019 GRANTEES: ACCESS YOUTH



With the support of the 2019 Many Hands \$100,000 Impact Grant, Access Youth launched its Peer Mediation Program at Ballou High School. The funding allowed Access Youth to hire a Peer Mediation Coordinator, develop a comprehensive peer mediation curriculum, training schedule, and programming, and provide fifty 11th grade students with four full days of training in February and additional virtual training after schools closed in March.

Once school resumes, Access Youth hopes to have students shadow Program Managers during Truancy/Student Support Team mediations before beginning to work more independently as Peer Mediators and Mentors.

Access Youth training has helped students develop critical listening, problem solving, and leadership skills. Last year, 85% of participating students showed growth in emotional intelligence, maintained regular school attendance, and avoided subsequent school suspensions. From September 2019 to March 2020, the number of suspensions at Ballou was the lowest in over a decade.

However, the pandemic and school closings have created enormous challenges. Many students now find themselves isolated without the support and safety of their peers and school communities. Many are experiencing food insecurity. Many lack access to the technology needed for distance learning and risk becoming academically disengaged and falling further behind. This risk is particularly acute for Access Youth students, who are often referred to the program due to low academic performance, exacerbated by chronic truancy and behavioral challenges.
